1. Read the following harokah.

Tanween (  )

- It is a noon saakinah (sukoon) that occurs at the end of nouns
- 3 types: Fathatain, Kasrotain, Dhommatain
- The tanwin always comes at the end of the word. Pronounced like a noon saakinah (sukoon) at the end of the word.

Examples:

$\text{نَ} + \text{بَ} = \text{بَنَّ}$	بَلَّغٌ	بَاخٍ	إِنْشَاءً
$\text{نَ} + \text{بِ} = \text{بِنِّي}$	سَمِيعٌ	إِلَهِ	صَلِحًا
$\text{نَ} + \text{بُ} = \text{بُنُّ$			

2. Listen carefully to the audio of a ta'awudz recitation. The first step to learn tajweed is to recognize mistakes. From the recording, I would like you to listen to the pronunciation of the throat letters only. Check the makhroj and the way harokaat pronounced. Read class notes in your notebook.

Use the checklist provided to check the possible mistakes in the recording.

أَعُوذُ بِاللَّهِ مِنَ الشَّيْطَانِ الرَّجِيمِ

I seek refuge with Allah from the accursed Satan

a. Throat letters

- Do you think letter 'ا' come out from the bottom throat?
- Do you think letter 'ع' come out from the middle throat?
- Do you think letter 'ه' come out from the bottom throat?

b. Harokaat

- Fathah: Is it pronounced by opening the mouth? Does it produce 'uh' sound?
- Kasroh: Is it pronounced by stretching the lower jaw? Does it produce 'ee' sound?
- Dommah: Is it pronounced by rounding the mouth? Does it produce 'oo' sound?

3. Practise to recite ta'awudz by applying the right makhroj and the ways harokaat pronounced for the throat letters.
